CONDITIONS

Local context: Brent is an outer London borough with a third (33%) of its households impoverished. 31% of its residents work for less than the London Living Wage (2nd only to Newham). The Borough has the 4th highest rent compared to lower quartile salary in London. Children and young people under 20 years of age comprise 25.4% of Brent's population and experience a level of child poverty worse than the England average at 23.4%. Brent is known to be the most diverse Borough in the UK, with 92.7% of Brent's school age children are BAME. Brent's 330,000 residents suffer as victims of a wide range of crimes, with anti-social behaviour and violent and sexual offences ranking the highest across each of the Borough's wards.

Policy Context: Underpinned by the Police and Crime Plan, that aims to make the city safe for children the Mayor of London has set up a new Violence Reduction Unit and Violent Crime Taskforce in 2018 to support the Metropolitan Police in tackling crime. The Young Londoners Fund and Stepping Stones program have been created to provide positive alternatives and opportunities for young people at risk of involvement in violent crime. London Gang Exit services have received investment to support young people at risk or engaged in serious violence to gain employment, education or training. 2019 is the year Brent has seen as series of high-profile violent crimes. As such, Brent Council held a 'time to talk' event in August 2019 to engage with the community on tackling violence and making Brent a safer place to live. There has been some success so far with knife-related crimes down by 31% in the past 12 months. Brent will be the London Borough of Culture in 2020 as awarded by the Mayor of London.

INPUTS

- Identification of targeted partners within the Borough who are already delivering the work to a high standard
- Production of joined-up and connected work happening in Brent, which will better support young people.
- Delivery of GRIT programme to enhance personal development AND

- Facilitation of a new way of thinking to ultimately change the dialogue for the young people and the adults around them
- Provision of training to stakeholders to upskill





ACTIVITIES

Provide Informal youth-based sessions

VL works with partner organisations and delivers focused support and activities that provide specific interventions to tackle Serious Youth Violence by raising young people's aspirations, ambition and agency to shape their families and communities through the positive choices they make.
